

### Dear Parents, FROM THE RECTOR

The issue of traffic congestion has kept us all occupied. That being said, it seems to have improved considerably this week. At school, we will continue to work on solutions. Top of the list is Rob Macaulay's drop-off point outside the school while I am attempting to have the timing on the traffic lights altered.

When you read this, I will be on camp with the Grade 7 girls. I am departing with as much anxiety as a parent.

Do we have sufficient safety protocols in place? Have we conducted enough drills? Have we anticipated every likely eventuality?

The Parktown Boys high school incident has left us all severely rattled.

In the past, St Peter's has had our fair share of incidents: bus breakdowns, broken arms, scorpion stings and the like. Fortunately, our preparations beforehand have always paid off and the staff have behaved admirably going above and beyond to care for the children.

I shudder to think of the potential for disaster in my past. As a young teacher, I reveled in introducing 12 and 13-year olds to "the bush". We would secure a camp site on a Big Five property in the Timbavati, Klasserie or Sabi Sands and set up a tented camp for ten children and three or four adults. During the day, we'd take the children on walks, armed with 12-gauge shotguns and sometimes .458s.

At night the children would each have an hour of guard duty around the fire. They would wake us if lions approached.

By the grace of God, we brought all the children home safely. Today, many of them either have their own bushveld retreats or are involved in some way in the conservation of nature. One, who retired at 39, takes me on trips to remote areas in Botswana and Zambia.

It's a difficult business balancing safety against providing children with the opportunity to enjoy new experiences and face new challenges.

I don't know how much longer school camps will continue. I suspect that it will be the teachers who decline to accept the responsibility before parents judge the risks to be too great.

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# FROM THE JUNIOR PREP

## FIRST SIX WEEKS

As mentioned in the Information Evenings, the first six weeks of school is an important time. Teachers show the boys that school is a safe place, that they are important and respected members of the St Peter's community and that they can all look forward to an engaging, challenging and fun year of learning.

We use the Responsive Classroom methodology at St Peter's and four general goals are followed during this time:

1. Create a climate of warmth, inclusion and safety: In order for children to learn, they must get to know each other and develop a sense of belonging and significance in the classroom. The boys learn reasonable boundaries for behaviour and teachers watch carefully to ensure all boys feel safe and included.

2. Teach classroom routines and behaviour expectations: Children need a sense of order and routine to their day in order to be available to learn. Teachers discuss all lessons and events at the start of each day during Morning Meetings so the boys are fully aware of what lies ahead. The boys are expected to take care of themselves, each other, their classroom and their school.

3. Help children care for their classroom and school environment: The boys are encouraged to develop a sense of ownership of their classroom and school environment. Collaboratively the class develop guidelines about classroom routines and expectations and they learn how to care for their school environment, uniform and equipment.

4. Establish expectations for academic work: Teachers generate excitement and enthusiasm for the curriculum which will be covered. Active participation, focused effort, engaging conversations, co-operation and collaboration are taught. Attention is paid to the process as well as the product and high expectations are held.
