


Dear Parents,

FROM THE HEADMASTER

In this Keyhole article, I would like to feed back to the community on another aspect of learning that we explored at the recent ICP conference. This session, which had as its catch phrase, "Preventing the Amygdala Blockade", looked at the emotional state of children as a determiner of their ability to learn and behave in different situations.



In simple terms, the brain's ability to function depends on the state of arousal in various areas. The illustration below shows these areas:

In order to optimise learning and behaviour, the adult needs to ensure that the child's executive brain can function. In times of stress, however, the primitive brain takes over and the amygdala releases chemicals preventing activation of the prefrontal cortex and effectively paralysing executive brain function. During the talk we explored how best to create the optimal conditions for learning using this research. It will come as no surprise that, the more adults pressurise the child for "results" and the lower the feeling of safety that the child experiences, the more the executive brain is blocked by this "amygdala blockade." Fear of failure creates an unsafe environment in which creativity dies.

In a nutshell; if we use exam and test results, batting average or goals scored as a stick (i.e. this is not good enough), we effectively paralyse the child's creativity. If, however, we concentrate on collaborative goal setting and formative feedback, we create a safe space for the child's learning journey and open the pathway to better executive functioning.

Yet another lesson to be learnt by all of us, whether we be parents, teachers or coaches.
