FROM THE HEADMASTER

We live in an age in which we are bombarded with information. Some of the information serves to provide an opportunity for us to interact with the world, but a large amount of it serves to either create joy, concern, or something in-between. Take programmes like Carte Blanche for instance. An exposé on corruption will serve to create a sense of dissonance within us, while a story about the drought could inspire us to act by saving water through conscious action. What is important is to be able to make the distinction between what is in our sphere of influence and what is simply within our sphere of concern.

Stephen Covey, in his book "The 8th Habit" talks about the "Circle of Concern" as being things that concern and interest you and the "Circle of Influence" as containing things over which you have some control (Covey 2004: 132). One of the most important aspects of character development and also well within our circle of influence as a "Thinking School" is to

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create boys who are proactive. These boys will be able to recognise situations over which they have some influence and choose to act in order to assert that influence to serve either their personal or societies' needs. Similarly, one's state of mental wellbeing is often influenced by matters that are outside our control. These issues can build up and create negativity towards our country, our school, individuals or a challenge that may face us. We should encourage our boys to identify what is outside their circle of influence and to rather concentrate on proactivity within the circle. I believe that we should also model this behaviour in our daily lives, particularly in discussions that may be "overheard" by our children. All too often they hear negativity from adult mouths, whether it be about the state of rugby in the country or a lack of discipline in certain areas of parliament. Should we not rather be focusing on the positive concepts of getting personally fit and playing a sport to the best of our ability; or living within a true spirit of "Ubuntu" during this St Peter's Year of the Woman? It is, after all, within both our circle of influence and our circle of concern to prepare our boys to be positive, proactive citizens of our country and the world.

I remind you that we have an opportunity to worship God in song and prayer as the Chapel Choir lead us in "Morning Prayer" this Sunday. The service begins at 08:00 and lasts approximately 40 minutes. Please join us for this special time of worship. The summer "team sport" season also comes to and end this week and we look forward to starting the athletics season on Monday.

FROM THE JUNIOR PREP THE IMPORTANCE OF IMAGINATION!

Parents and teachers can do a great deal to enable their children to rediscover their imaginations. Extracts from an article written for Childtime Learning Centres give us some sound advice:

The Importance of Imagination

Do children today use their imaginations as much as we did when we were kids? Do you see your children spinning incredible tales and stories in their fantasy play like we used to when we played "cops and robbers" or "house"? Or does your child's fantasy play seem to consist only of repetitive movements like karate chops or ballerina spins that have no story to them?

In the world of child development you may hear us use phrases like "critical thinking skills" and "creative problem-solving abilities" when referring to our goals for your child's cognitive development. What we are really talking about is... imagination. The way to create human beings with imagination is to provide them with opportunities to develop it for themselves when they are very young. These opportunities are found in one place and one place only... play. Playing with paints, playing with play dough, with costumes, with glue and with crayons. Making a mess. Exploring the woods. Splashing in a puddle. Wondering at a caterpillar you notice inching by you. Pretending to be a bird, gliding through the sky.

Are you providing your children enough opportunities for this type of play? If they are spending hours sitting at a computer, watching television or playing video games, they are passive participants being fed someone else's stories instead of having the time and space to dream up their own. If they are enrolled in soccer, ballet, karate and gymnastics all in the same week, they are receiving wonderful opportunities to develop their skills. But they have little to no opportunity to use their creativity and imagination to decide how to use their free time, what fantasy to explore or what part of their world they'd like to discover more about at their own pace, in their own way.

Often parents today think that if they give their children too much free time they are wasting opportunities for learning and preparing children for their futures. But these types of parental choices, though done with love and the best of intentions, are not a gift to children, according to current child development theory and research. Children today desperately need time and space to develop their creative imaginations free from adult agendas. Even if your children complain, "I'm bored! There's nothing to do!" please, please trust that if you force them to figure out for themselves how to fill their time, their innate creativity will kick in and their imaginations will soar!
