FROM THE HEADMASTER

I hope that everyone enjoyed the long weekend and is refreshed and ready for the run down to the end of the first term. Tuesday's celebrations of Human Rights Day around the country included a festival of dance during which people celebrated their individuality and independence. Independence and the right to independence has been the catalyst for many struggles around the world. In addition, we speak about independent thought and independent decision making regularly in our modern world. The term independent is defined in the Collins English Dictionary as, "...not dependent on anything else for function,...not reliant on support." This is certainly a condition to be aspired to, but is independence a right or is it a skill?

I believe that independence is a skill that needs to be developed and that, in its purest form grows into inter-dependence, which means that we can rely on others and, in turn, be relied upon to complete a task in support of those around us. This state begins with being able to do things for ourselves. To this end we should be consciously preparing our boys to take on responsibility for their own learning. I expand on a couple of positive parenting actions that would help with this growth below:

- Preparing his own school and sports bags for the following day. While it may be more time consuming than simply checking the Communicator and packing accordingly, by working with your boy you will not only empower him so that you don't need to pack his bags the following year, but you will prepare him for later life. In addition, if there is a pair of socks missing from his kit he will own the problem rather than defaulting to the standard "...my mother/helper forgot..." Perhaps by facing the consequence of his disorganisation, he will also learn to be more proactive next time.
- Drop him off and let him carry his own bags. I mentioned in the PA AGM that we are noticing more and more parents carrying their children's sports bags, dragging cricket kit and even carting lunch boxes all the way to the classroom while the boy skips along behind. This becomes an expectation for the boy and before you know it he will expect you to make his bed, pick up his dirty washing and even take his dirty dishes to the kitchen. Do some of these "chores" sound familiar? The growth towards an independent and self-disciplined life is scaffolded by many small tasks. While there may be a need for some "difficult conversations" you will be preparing him for a happy and successful high school experience and adulthood.

As an aside, making our boys more independent would also help with our growing carpark challenges. While the number of boys in the school has not increased over the past four years, our carpark woes have. We are conducting a traffic flow study to try to alleviate the problem, but I am fairly confident that part of the solution will be to revert to the days where boys were dropped off at school and not escorted or assisted all the way to the classroom. I suppose that, while this will not facilitate an individual's independence, it may fall under the category of our community inter-dependence, where we all rely on each other to follow the traffic guidelines and drop-off areas to alleviate carpark rage.

By growing our boys' independence we will be preparing them for the challenges they will face in the increasingly more complex society in which we live.
