Dear Parents,

FROM THE HEADMASTER

As I take this opportunity to welcome you all back from the mid-term break I would like to share some thoughts regarding our ongoing campaign to ensure that our boys continue to grow in their character and grooming during this final half term of the year.

I received a phone call from an Old Boy, who is also a parent, on Tuesday morning. During the course of the call, he told me that there was a significant change in the greeting and wearing of uniform since he had attended the school. He shared that, in his day, if the boys did not greet or if their socks were down they were caned. I had the sense that there was a feeling that we have become soft in the modern era and that a return to the cane would be welcomed. Naturally, as all Headmasters do, I took his comments to heart and spent quite some time reflecting on what had been said and how to address this challenge.

Society today is very different to even 20 years ago and there is certainly an element of entitlement, consumerism and a belief that we are above the law. Individual rights are being stressed to the point that community responsibility is seen as an infringement on the right to be an individual. "Boosterism" (the belief that we must praise our children regardless of their performance, otherwise they will suffer from a sense of worthlessness and despair) has become a clear trend in parenting advice, of which there is a plethora of contradictory views on the internet. All of this means that we need to build children who are intrinsically motivated to hold themselves in an upright fashion, not for fear of consequences, but because they feel proud to be who they are. This can only be developed through training and overcoming challenges. Thus, we need to develop producers of positive external behaviour rather than consumers of norms.

I spoke to the boys in Chapel this morning, sharing my concern that we were not performing as well in the "Greeting" and "Grooming" fields as happened 20 years ago. I asked them to look at their shoes. I suggested that the state of their shoes, be it shining and bright, unpolished, "laceless," collapsed backs or even the totally incorrect footwear would give them a good indication of how they were outwardly demonstrating their pride in our school. I challenged them to make the first step of polishing their own shoes, of greeting at least five 'outside' adults during the day and of getting into the correct habits, not because they were afraid of being caned, but because they were proud of being part of St Peter's, their family and from their own sense of personal worth. I realise that the required behaviours can only be achieved through a concerted effort to reinforce and model requirements by all the responsible adults in our community. My appeal, therefore, is that we as parents, teachers and support staff become producers in the culture of intrinsic growth rather than pure consumers of school outputs. I am sure we will all rise to the challenge.


CHRISTMAS BOXES
