# FROM THE HEADMASTER

Having returned to school after the Heritage Day weekend, I thought that it may be appropriate to look at our own St Peter's "heritage" and what it means to be part of the community. I believe that the greatest strength of St Peter's is our grounding in the Christian Faith. While this grounding is definitely not exclusive, we welcome children and families from many other faiths at the school and celebrate the diversity that we are privileged to experience as a result, our basic ethos is firmly set in the Anglican Tradition of the Christian Faith. This grounding serves to inform us in our decision making and our Chaplain, Father Richard, sits on EXCO and ensures that we adhere to Christian values and doctrines. This common thread of faith allows us to find unity in our diversity and provides a "safe space" for the children to explore the complexity of the broader South African community.

Those who read this newsletter regularly will be familiar with the conscious effort that St Peter's makes to bring our parents from various cultures and heritage together through events such as the "My Story" evenings that take place twice a term. These events are diarised and everyone is welcome to attend. In our celebration of Heritage Day, two special "My Story" events were held last week. The first, a bring-and-share harvest table, took place in the Boys JP. Food from various cultures was brought in by participants and as groups moved around the tables they heard why the dish was significant for a particular culture and, in some cases, the personal stories behind the choice. The second group of storytellers met in the Girls JP Hall and here items of memorabilia or cultural clothing were used as the stimulus for conversation. Once again, the power of sitting in community and sharing stories, asking questions and, very importantly laughing together, was highlighted. Unless you have attended a "My Story" event you will not be able to appreciate the power and sense of belonging that these events inculcate. The principles of the prayer of St Francis are an important part of the evenings. I share this well-known prayer below:

Lord make me an instrument of your peace Where there is hatred let me sow love Where there is injury, pardon Where there is doubt, faith Where there is despair, hope Where there is darkness, light And where there is sadness, joy O divine master grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console to be understood as to understand To be loved as to love For it is in giving that we receive it is in pardoning that we are pardoned And it's in dying that we are born to eternal life







The St Peter's community is one in which we celebrate our togetherness and acceptance of each other, not only in principle, but in active sharing of who we are and consciously seeking to understand first and then to be understood. Please join us for our next "My Story" event.

# FROM THE JUNIOR PREP

## HERITAGE DAY HARVEST TABLE

On Thursday, 20 September the JP Social Cohesion team hosted a wonderful evening celebrating our various heritages by means of sharing food from a harvest table. This was an evening of sharing and growing as a Junior Prep Community at St Peter's.

Due to the theme we hosted a cooking demonstration using the three legged pot. The legs of our pot represents the St Peter's Community – one leg is the children who attend our school, the other their parents and the last leg represents their teachers. If one leg was to break off we would not be able to complete our meal successfully. All three are required to create a safe, nurturing community for our families.

The ingredients for today's demonstration include our values as we believe this is what feeds our community:

#### **Respect:**

Our first ingredient is *respect*; within a community *respect* leads to loyalty. Without *respect* for one another friendships cannot grow. The ingredient *respect* is one of the founding values of the world in which we live. Without *respect* within our community we cannot move forward.

### **Responsibility:**

After a quick stir we add *responsibility* to our pot – as members of a community, we need to take *responsibility* for each other; and as role models to the younger generation we need to be counted on to do what is expected and say what is right. This includes developing an understanding for and tolerance of others views.

#### Honour:

Let the pot simmer over a low heat adding the ingredient *honour* slowly to the mix. For a community to thrive one should support the relationship between families and their collective *honour*. Family *honour* is impacted by many aspects of our daily lifestyle including religion, clothing, hobbies, culture and food.

### Compassion:

Next we need to add a sprinkling of *compassion*, the golden rule of treating others as you would like to be treated, will allow for *compassion* to thrive within a community. Communities should be driven by the idea that beneath conflict, inequality and indifference runs a deep river of *compassion*, engulfed in an aquifer of loving kindness.

## Collaboration:

A heaped spoonful of *collaboration* will add to the flavour. It is *collaboration* that makes it possible to reach a goal that cannot be achieved by one person alone. An element of trust is required for *collaboration* to be successful – we need to remember that it takes a village to raise a child.

### Resilience:

Put the lid on the pot after adding *resilience*, as this represents a community's ability to recover from adverse situations and demands that we support others in their time of need, whilst celebrating each other's successes.

Our pot is ready to enjoy! Never forget that everyone's heritage has many positive influences on community building and growing our rainbow nation. We would like to thank both the PA and the amazing Social Cohesion team for the time and effort they put into the evening. Thanks to the parents and staff who attended and shared their heritage stories so willingly. It certainly gave Heritage Day an extra special tone in 2018.
