### FROM THE HEADMASTER

The points below have been lifted from various studies and, while generalised, we believe that they can be attributed to primary school boys:

- 1. Cognitive maturity develops at a slower rate during the early primary years and then accelerates during the upper school phase.
- 2. Young boys have more acute vision for distance and moving objects than do their female siblings. This means that active and very busy collaboration within groups is a favourite learning environment for the majority.
- 3. While boundaries are seen as something to be challenged, boys actually thrive in a clearly structured and demarcated environment.
- 4. Challenge and competition play an important role in motivation, both in the classroom and on the sports field.
- 5. Boys are "pack animals" and much of their behaviour occurs within this context.
- 6. Monastic education offers a safe place for boys to take risks, express their emotions and explore subjects such as art, drama, music and D&T.
- 7. The internalisation of concepts, particularly when emotional components are at play, tends to be slower in prep school boys. They need a longer period to get a good grasp of these concepts, but are then able to expand on
- 8. A boys-only environment can be adapted to accommodate the different rate of verbal development that boys experience.

# STOP UNDERMINING YOUR CHILD'S TEACHERS

Wherever I go at the moment, I hear about instances of parents undermining their child's teacher – often, in front of them. This does nothing to foster respect between learner and teacher, and will ultimately get in the way of a child's learning experience in the classroom.

While we don't always agree with our children's teachers, those disagreements must be dealt with in private and not within earshot of our children. We are doing our children a disservice, risking raising children who are egocentric, who give up too quickly when things get a little hard and who are quick to blame others for their lack of happiness or success.

In Blair King's article in the Huffington Post, from 14 March 2016, he shares four very solid pieces of advice for parents (in bold below) that I go on to explain because I agree with them.

Parents, you are not your child's best friend, you are their parent. This is such a common trap parents fall into today in an effort to keep everyone smiling and happy. Be your child's best friend at your peril - soon they will be pulling all the strings and calling the shots – with you and everyone else. When you have got them to adulthood then you can be best friends.

Parents, learned helplessness is your fault, not your child's. When we are constantly clearing and smoothing the path for our children they are at risk of becoming helpless and lacking in resourcefulness. They also know that if they tell a parent they can't do something or that it is too difficult, then their parent is likely to step in and complete the task for them. This leaves children incapable, illequipped and unwilling to try and figure out how to accomplish tasks for themselves.

Parents, you must advocate for your kids but you must also support your child's teacher. We are not in the classroom with our child, and they can behave quite differently in class than they do at home. Blair, who is married to a teacher with 15 years' experience, says

that parents often forget that teachers are trained professionals and don't treat them with the respect they deserve.

"If you question your child's teacher in front of your child, you are telling your child that the teacher's authority is not to be respected. When a teacher tells you something, don't turn to your child and ask if what their teacher is saying is true. You may think you are involving your child in the discussion, but what you have actually done is to question that teacher's reliability to their face. Think of it from the teacher's perspective. You have essentially told them that you won't believe what they just told you until your child confirms it."

Parents, your child's teacher cannot replace your role in your child's education. As parents are paying more for their children's education and spending more time at work, they are expecting teachers to pick up the slack and fill in for them, instilling manners, good behaviour and values, for example. This is our job as parents, and teachers just don't have enough hours in the day to take this on. Of course, they will supplement what we teach our children at home and build on our foundations, but we must take responsibility for building those foundations.

School cannot prepare your child for the future alone, and neither can you. It is going to take a strong partnership between home, school, teacher and learner, and this needs to be based on mutual respect.
