Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parents & Students,

The Derek Redmond Story

At the recently held Academic Prize-Giving I stated the following: "We need to be very careful that our understandable desire to protect and encourage doesn't translate into responses which actually have the effect of saying that a B or a C grade is a failure; that to be in a set other than the **Top Set** is indicative of a problem and, dare I say it on an occasion such as this, that **NOT** winning a prize tonight renders all other achievements in the year as negligible.

In the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, American athlete Quincy Watts ran the 2nd fastest time ever at that time, to win the Gold medal in the men's 400m in a blistering 43.71s – I would like to equate Quincy Watt's time to a highly talented maths student who obtained an A+ in his final matric examinations.

However, this performance was overshadowed by British athlete **Derek Redmond**. You may ask, how can another athlete's performance be superior to that of your gold medal winner? **Derek Anthony Redmond** (born 3 September 1965) was a British athlete, who during his career held the British record for the 400 metres sprint, and won gold medals in the 4x400 metres relay at the World Championships and European Championships.

However, injuries consistently interrupted Redmond's career. At the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, he pulled out of the opening round of the 400 metres 90 seconds before his heat because of an injury to his Achilles tendon. Before the 1992 Barcelona Summer Olympics, he had undergone eight operations due to injuries.

Redmond was in good form by the time of the Barcelona Olympics. He posted the fastest time of the first round and went on to win his quarter-final. In the semi-final, Redmond started well, but in the back straight about 250 metres from the finish, his hamstring tore. He hobbled to a halt, and then fell to the ground in pain. Stretcher bearers made their way over to him, but Redmond decided he wanted to finish the race. He began to hobble along the track.

He was soon joined on the track by his father, Jim Redmond, who barged past security and on to the track to get to his son. Jim and Derek completed the lap of the track together, with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder for support. As they crossed the finish line, the crowd of 65,000 spectators rose to give Derek a standing ovation. However, as his father had helped him finish, Derek was officially disqualified and Olympic records state that he "Did Not Finish" the race.

Even though Derek Redmond did not finish and never won an Olympic medal, his struggle in the 1992 semi-final became the subject of one of the International Olympic Committee's "Celebrate Humanity" videos, which proclaimed: "Force is measured in kilograms. Speed is measured in seconds. Courage? You can't measure courage". Redmond and his father finished dead last, but he and his father finished"!

Boys and girls, it is very nice to win prizes and we are incredibly proud of our prize-winners, our gold medalists, but let's be clear, if you link motivation to winning prizes in life, you set yourself up for disappointment.

A B or a C grade is not a failure; it's a work in progress - Because the greatest prize of all is when you can look yourself in the eye and say, 'I tried my absolute best' – Derek Redmond most certainly did!



Wellness Department - How can we help you?

We are fortunate enough at St Peter's College to offer our students and parents various avenues of assistance to enhance and assist the academic programme. In order for our assistance to work effectively it is necessary to explain the procedure and also who is who.

How do I make an appointment?

The Wellness Department adheres to a strict protocol for referrals in order to ensure that the best interest of all students at St Peter's College are attended to appropriately. Please find the procedural steps to follow should you require the services provided:

Step 1: Parents/ teachers contact the Grade Head to report concern or reason for referrals

The Grade Heads then refer request to the Wellness Department

A member from the Wellness Department contacts parents to contract consent and for background information

Once consent is acheived, the student is then contacted for the initial consultation

6-8 Consultations are then scheduled between the Wellness Department and the student

In order for your child to be seen by either of the Educational Psychologists or Mrs Hopwood an email needs to be sent to the relevant Grade Head and Mr Brian Armitage (<u>armitageb@stpeterscollege.co.za</u>) needs to be copied in on the mail.

Therapy or psycho-educational assessments can be done either with Mrs Laila Jeebodh Desai (psychologist@stpeterscollege.co.za) or Mrs Holly Ryder-Nimb (ryderh@stpeterscollege.co.za). Informed consent must be obtained for both therapy and assessments as this is a Health Professions Council of South Africa requirement. There is no cost for the therapy, but assessments are charged at R5600. An assessment is necessary before an application for an accommodation, for Cycle Tests and Examinations, can be made to the IEB. It's important to note that not all students need an assessment.

Study Skills and Learning Profiling can be booked with Mrs Hopwood, a qualified Advanced Mind Moves Instructor at hopwoodl@stpeterscollege.co.za. Learning profile assessments are scheduled after school and there is a cost of R70 to cover the report. The appointments typically take about an hour and a half and require a parent to be present as feedback is given immediately. All students may benefit from having a Learning Profile done, specifically in terms of how to overcome challenges to learning as well as how to study best according to individual strengths. A Learning Profile cannot be used towards an IEB accommodation.
