FROM THE HEADMASTER

I have a Spaniel named Ringo. He is a beautiful and intelligent animal and yet, he is useless! The reason for this is that he has learnt how to look at humans with big brown eyes, resulting in the family falling over themselves to pat him, pick him up, feed him or pamper him in any other way. Thus, while Ringo is a perfectly capable animal, his functioning as a dog is almost non-existent. As we begin the second half of the Easter term, I thought that it may be useful to use this analogy to test our own role as parents in the creation of conditioned helplessness in our boys.

While one of our values is Resilience, modern parenting, with all its love and good intentions, sometimes creates just the opposite. All meaningful learning comes with a degree of emotional engagement in the situation. Thus, while we know that boys will always test boundaries, their actions will come with a set of consequences, which will lead to learning taking place. Therefore, unless I have learnt to "take the flack" for not packing my own PE clothes, I will believe that responsibility is something that my parents are obliged to take for me and that no matter how important mum or dad's morning meeting is, it is perfectly rational to expect them to drop everything to ensure that I don't suffer any discomfort as a result of my negligence. Once I have packed my clothes, is it correct that I expect mum, dad or my au pair to lug the school bag, cricket kit and my cool box to class while I skip along behind? If I am perfectly capable of changing into my sports kit at the beginning of the practice, why do I expect my parent to dress me as I change back into uniform when I go home?

On the academic front, the boys are often told about the requirements for a piece of work during lessons. If they are not concentrating, they may miss out on this vital piece of information. This does not matter in the greater scheme of things and, by preparing the wrong section for an assessment or having to spend some of their own time "catching up," they build not only the resilience to take responsibility for their actions, but are also empowered to take responsibility for their learning. This is something that our high schools' feedback scores St Peter's boys particularly highly on. Lives are not changed by a failed spelling assessment, but lives are changed by the purposeful taking of responsibility for personal development in general.

In our house, we often tease each other about having a "Ringo" moment. Have you caught yourself having your own "Ringo" moment with your son? If you have, remember that by allowing him to fend for himself and take responsibility for his actions, while somewhat uncomfortable at the time, you will be preparing him to be a resilient and capable young man into the future.

In view of the reports on Listeriosis in the press, I would like to reassure you that we don't serve polony or viennas on our menu except on hot dog days. We have, however, removed all ham and salami from the teatime sandwich menu for the time being.

The use of processed food products is quite limited, as we prefer to do home cooked meals. All sausages/boerewors are purchased from our local butcher, where they are produced on site. The cold meats served are limited to ham and salami, purchased from Bidfood (part of the Bidvest group) and are not of the "Enterprise" brand.
