FROM THE RECTOR

A Report from Derek Wilcocks

On Thursday, 8 March 2018, Greg Royce invited a group of parents involved in the information technology industry to join a think tank to review information technology at St Peter's. Six parents kindly volunteered their time and met with the Heads and information technology staff, on both the technology provision and teaching sides, of both the Boys and Girls Prep Schools. The evening kicked off with Dieter Gloss, the IT Manager, giving an overview of the information technology infrastructure in place on the St Peter's campus. The overview covered connectivity, telephony, security, storage and continuity. In each instance issues such as reliability, performance, value for money and ability to meet future needs were addressed. After the review the parents congratulated Dieter and his team on their efforts over the past five years. After the presentation and ensuing discussion, no significant architectural or other changes were proposed.

Thereafter, Scott Hauptfleisch presented the approach to introducing children to devices, programming, robotics and general computer skills. He explained that the goal is to provide our children with platform independent skills, so that they are comfortable entering different high schools with different platform standards. The investment in using tools such as *Scratch* for programming and *Lego Robotics* kits was praised by the assembled parents, who felt that this best prepares our children for a world where the integration between computers and physical processes will deeply affect the career and entrepreneurial choices available to them. Scott also covered the use of robotics to teach other academic skills, such as age-appropriate sequencing and logical reasoning in a fun and highly interactive way. Some discussion ensued about future directions, covering ideas about artificial intelligence and other emerging technologies and how these technologies will affect our curriculum and the children. Scott also spoke about some of the development opportunities that he and other teachers have been exposed to, to ensure they are up to date with the latest thinking on the safe and innovative application of information technology in teaching.

The evening concluded on a very positive note with high praise for all the St Peter's staff involved in information technology. Our school and our children are in good information technology hands. Thank you once again to the parents who volunteered their time and expertise and who continue to assist the school in obtaining the best possible value in procuring technology and providing encouragement and advice to our highly dedicated and motivated Heads, teachers and administrative staff. Ultimately, most thanks is due to the teachers who have taken up the challenge of preparing the children for high schools and ultimately for professional life where technology plays an increasingly foundational role.

FROM THE HEADMASTER

Last week I wrote about the concept of learnt helplessness. This week I would like to share our philosophy regarding success, character and the ethos of a St Peter's boy.


The measure of a St Peter's boy is based on his character and not how well he does in academics or sporting activities. Thus, the achievement of an "A" aggregate or selection for the "A" or "B" sports teams does not make a pupil more important or worthy of praise. Rather, it is through full participation, a growth mind-set and grit that our boys become "true St Peter's boys." This has always been the philosophy of the school and our pupils are sought after by many high schools because of their quiet confidence and competence across the board. Unfortunately, our philosophy is sometimes undermined by the modern drive to be "the best" in everything. This demand has become a part of the broader culture in which the boys are growing up. It is starting to affect the pupils and we are picking up incidences of boys saying things like "You're not in the 'A' team so you can't play soccer with us." This is unacceptable from a St Peter's boy and we will be taking measures to ensure that it does not happen. Please may I ask that parents talk to their sons and reinforce this message?

Prep school sport is aimed at maximum participation, maximum fun and the development of skills that will stand a boy in good stead when he makes choices regarding participation in sport at a high school level. It is used as a channel to enhance the development of positive character traits, as espoused by the *St Peter's Values*. While there are those boys who thrive in an ultra-competitive environment, I have experienced occasions where talented boys have consciously chosen not to be in the 'A' team because of not being able to enjoy their participation as a result of negative pressure put on top teams by over-competitive supporters. This choice is perfectly acceptable. We should never forget that these are little boys who are still developing physically and emotionally. If a boy measures his worth by which team he plays in and his classmates have a growth spurt which he doesn't experience, there is a very real danger that, when he does not make the team he expects to make, his self-worth will be negatively impacted and, consequently, all aspects of his school and family life. Thus, while it is good to applaud success, we must be careful of creating the impression that our positive regard for our sons is based on their team selection. Carol Dweck, who has done significant research into the growth mind-set, advocates that we applaud effort, bounce back and good sportsmanship rather than team selection or results. The quality of participation and growth, therefore, outweighs the result in all cases at prep school level.

As is always the case with boys, they will act on what they observe and internalise long before what they are told. This has implications for us as we look forward to very busy rugby, soccer and hockey seasons in the months to come. Before this, however, we have the excitement of inter-house athletics in two weeks' time. Please join us as we enjoy watching every boy strive for the highest according to his own innate potential and applaud his effort.

REMINDER: TOMORROW IS PYJAMA DAY




PAVER PLAQUES


