Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parents, Students and Staff,

DON'T BE A DUCK, BE AN EAGLE: You have two alternatives. You can blend in with the mould or you can rise above the rest.

The subsequent account is one which you may have heard before, and which formed part of my Valedictory speech to last year's matriculants, but it bears repeating. **Harvey Mackay**, a well-known writer and motivational speaker, recounts the brilliant story about a cab driver, who demonstrated this feature.

Harvey was waiting in line for a ride at the airport. When a cab pulled up, the original thing Harvey noticed was how the taxi was polished to a brilliant shine. Stylishly dressed with a white shirt, black tie, and newly pressed black slacks, the taxi driver jumped out and rounded the automobile to ajar the rear passenger door for Harvey.

He gave Harvey a plastic-coated card and said, "I'm Wally, your driver. While I am loading your baggage within the trunk I would like you to read my mission statement." Greatly surprised, Harvey read the card. It read: Wally's Mission Statement: 'Get my customers to their destination within the quickest, safest, and cheapest way possible inside a friendly environment.'

This blew Harvey away ... particularly as soon as he noticed that the interior of the cab matched the outer surface. Perfectly clean! As he slid behind the wheel, Wally asked, "Would you like a cup of coffee? I have a thermos of regular and one of decaf." Harvey said jokingly, "No, I'd prefer a soft drink." The rest of the drivers quacked akin to ducks and shared with him every one of the factors they couldn't complete any of what he suggested. Wally the cab driver made an uncommon choice. He decided to halt quacking akin to a duck and began soaring reminiscent of an eagle.

We underwent a training course 25 and 26 January with Lead 4 Life, to learn skills to help us be the best leaders to our Grade 8s. The course was over two days; Wednesday and Thursday. An Exchange Student's Swiss Experience

August last year I left to start the best year of my life thus far.

I spent a year in Switzerland on a cultural exchange to learn how life is lived as a Swiss citizen. It was the most beneficial experience and I am beyond grateful to have had the opportunity to grow, mature and learn to become so independent in the way that I did.

I spent my exchange living in the capital, Bern. I was fortunate enough to have received what they referred to as a "GA" - General Abonnement- which allowed me to use all Swiss public transport for free as well as the transport that extended into the first city of each neighboring country (Italy, France, Germany and Austria).

Because of this GA I was able to experience and travel more than just Switzerland. In my first three months there I learnt German and by my sixth month, Swiss German making me one of the first exchange students to learn both languages (and yes, there is a very big difference).

The school system was rather different as it started at 08:00 and only ended at 18:00. Ten hours of school may sound like a lot but with 15 minute breaks in between each lesson and then not being given as much homework or projects, it wasn't that bad.

The safety and freedom are what I miss the most (other than the friends I made, of course). I was able to walk wherever I needed to go no matter the distance, area or time of day and whether I was with friends or alone made no difference.

Being there without my family meant I had to be self-sufficient both emotionally and financially so while I was there I took on several jobs.

Of course I missed my family and friends especially around Christmas time but not once did I feel the need to end my exchange and come home. I loved it there and hope that one day I will be able to go back.

As much as I enjoyed my time there, it is not to say my journey was a smooth one. There were moments where my strength was tested and I thought that I wouldn't be able to carry on but overcoming those moments is what made the exchange such a memorable experience. I wouldn't have changed those ups and downs for anything, as they shaped me into the person that I am now.

A year is a long time to be away from home but I wouldn't have been able to integrate into a new culture and way of life if I hadn't spent that amount of time there. It sounds like a long time for a 16 year old girl to leave her family for the first time, but it went by so incredibly fast. It's an opportunity that I would say, should you be lucky enough to have it come your way, grab it with both hands.
