Welcome back to our Advent Term – we look forward to a busy season of growth for all.



IT Update

Exciting upgrades planned for Internet Access at St Peter's College

St Peter's College has decided that in order to facilitate the successful implementation of BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) in 2016 the following changes will be made.

All management of IT will be **outsourced to Netology**, this includes servers, Wi-Fi and day to day IT events. Netology will also provide a **technician** on a daily basis to help staff and students with their basic IT needs.

The **Wi-fi infrastructure** will be entirely replaced with a state of the art **Ruckus** installation which will be monitored and installed by Netology.

Also a new **fibre internet** link upgrade from our current 20mbs to **100mbs** with a 1 to 1 contention rate will be provided by Bitco.

As regards the recommended device students can use at the College, **minimum basic specifications are being researched and separate communication** will be sent later this year with the relevant details.

These changes will be implemented before the end of 2015, and supported by the ongoing training of staff and students.
