THE ST PETER'S COLLEGE SPORTS AND CULTURAL FESTIVAL

During this coming weekend from Friday, 14 – Sunday, 16 September 2018, St Peter's College will be hosting our 15th Annual Invitational Sports and Cultural Festival, which includes a myriad of sport and cultural activities, such as, Soccer, Basketball, Netball, Chess, Debating, Street Art, a Choir festival and others at our St Peter's College Campus.

St Peter's College will host close to 2 000 participants, 52 schools, plus parents, friends and families. The teams on the day are diverse, encompassing independent schools, former model C schools and previously disadvantaged schools, as well as, teams from our neighbouring countries, namely Waterford and Enjabulweni from Swaziland. This Festival is a true representation of the entire spectrum of South Africa's population, and we are the first school in South Africa to host an event of this nature where there are more than 100 teams participating in a myriad of activities. The Grade 9 students will also be hosting an entrepreneurship event on the Friday and Saturday of the Festival.

The schools that participate in this Festival have previously come from Zimbabwe, Durban, Cape Town, White River, Nelspruit, Mafikeng, Bloemfontein Pietermaritzburg, Pretoria, East London and African countries such as, Zimbabwe, Mozambique and Swaziland. We at St Peter's College are committed to making this the most prestigious school's Sports and Cultural Festival not only in South Africa, but in Africa. We have made a strong commitment to host this annual Festival, as we firmly believe that the sports and cultural events on offer, are a true representation of what the majority of South Africans support and believe in.

Friendships, sometime lifelong, develop during these Festivals. Yi attended training at the SAMF's Wits Siyanqoba Training Centre. He was also part of the Wits Siyanqoba team which won the Junior division of the 2017 ASSA Mathematics Team Competition.

Grade 9 Outing to Wits University



The Grade 9 Students engaged in a project titled 'The Future is Exciting'. The aim of the project was to expose students to what waits for them after they finish school. The project included an 'Amazing Race' around WITS University where teams competed against each other to complete several tasks around the campus. The course included tasks on East and West Campus and showed students the various faculties and facilities at the University. Activities involved using QR codes to find out about the history of statues and alumna and posting answers about the campus and student organisations to Twitter.

The day aimed to incorporate a number of subjects. Students were required to measure the Tower of Light and Champion Tree using their clinometers and trigonometry for Mathematics. Science and History were incorporated through tasks in the Oppenheimer Life Sciences Museum and Origins Center. Dance and Art were incorporated through activities in the Trance Dance and Tapestry Room of the Origins Center. Students also had the opportunity to visit the WITS Art Museum, where they viewed the current exhibition 'Beyond the Readymade' by Dr Alison Kearney. Students used the answers and photos collected throughout the day to complete a storyboard using the CANVA software.

As part of the project, the school hosted world renowned paleontologist Lindsay Hunter. Lindsay, was part of the elite team, nicknamed the 'underground astronauts' who were responsible for extracting the fossils that led to the discovery of Homo Naledi. Lindsay spoke to the whole school about her work on the 'Rising Star Expedition' and her current work as a PhD student at the University of Witwatersrand.

The College also hosted 27 professionals in various fields, who completed a 'Speed Date your Future' activity with the Grade 9s. The groups had five minutes to interview the different professionals, to gain insight into what the working world involved and the different opportunities that are available to them.

The final activity involved a workshop hosted by the staff and students from the Department of Surgery at the University of Witwatersrand. The Grade 9 students were involved in taking their blood pressure, reading x-rays, viewing histology slides, completing reflex tests and learning surgical suture techniques. The workshop provided the Grade 9s with the opportunity to interact with the medical students and learn more about what would be expected from them if they were to pursue careers in the medical profession.

Overall, the three day project was a success and provided our Grade 9 students with a glimpse into their bright futures. Ms Nicole Candy

Grade 11 Introduction to SAT's

Please note: Students may write the SAT 1s as many times as they like. It is recommended that Grade 11s write the SAT 1s for the first time in December of their Grade 11 year or January/March of their Grade 12 year and then plan to write again (hopefully for the final time) in May of Grade 12.

Most top USA Universities require students to write the SAT 1s.

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SAT Preparation Workshop

This is aimed at Grade 11 students who would like to know a little more of what to expect when first writing the SATs. Grade 12 students who have not yet written the SATs are welcome to attend. This consists of 2 sessions on Saturday 22 September which will be conducted by experienced SAT trainers as well as a complete information session as to how the application process works. The cost for the full day (both sessions) will be R1100-00. Pre-registration and payment up front is essential.

Classes will only be confirmed if a minimum of 8 students enroll. PLEASE NOTE: SAT PREP CLASSES SHOULD BE PAID FOR <u>IN ADVANCE</u>.
