Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parents, Students and Staff,

Exams are well underway at the College, with the Matrics nearing the end of their examination schedule, and the Grade 8 to 11 students mid-way through theirs.

Examinations are always a very stressful and anxious time for both students and parents. Examinations are a central feature of school systems in many countries and a large amount of emphasis is placed on examination results, especially the final Matric results.

In a recent letter to Principals of Independent Schools, the CEO of the IEB (Independent Examination Board), Anne Oberholzer alerts us to be mindful when using these results as a marketing tool.

"Our society tends to believe that the value of a school lies in its ability to churn out learners with outstanding results and a matric class with a 100% pass rate. The obsession with pass rates as measures of quality and success fuels intense media scrutiny, without necessarily understanding the massive complexities that sit behind those numbers".

Anne suggests that a more important step than emphasising simply how great those results are, would be for schools such as St Peter's College to define what it is about our College that enables our students to achieve these results? How do we make the educational experience of our students positive, supportive, empowering and encouraging? Here I must give credit to our academic faculty who have bought into the benevolent intent of the College, which is to "Empower Individuals for Life". I am always astounded at the results attained by our students, especially when we are one of the very few independent schools in South Africa who don't have entrance exams, hence "Cherry Picking" students. Our teachers make students want to work and achieve the very best results they can.

Anne further emphasises the need for *"Society to look beyond results and ask deeper, more relevant questions. How does the school support a child to be the best they can possibly be not only academically, but also in other important realms - as a teammate, a friend, a citizen, mindful of injustice, discrimination and bullying?"*


In a powerful statement, Anne mentions that *"Distinctions cannot be the only measure of a school's worth. Sometimes it's the Cs, Ds and Es that reflect true achievement"*.

Thus, whilst we wait in anticipation for our students' results in Grade 8-11 to be released at the beginning of December, and our matric results on 2 January 2018, it is important that we reflect and celebrate each individual student, not just for results, but for their overall contribution in all areas.

In conclusion, in Anne's words: *"As we celebrate the Matrics of 2017 - the group is diverse, their levels of achievement - diverse, and their challenges real. Let's inspire and motivate them to enter their young adult lives with encouragement and respect at every level and an appreciation of what holistic achievement is all about"*.

Go *"Bravely into the Future"*.
