Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parents, Students and Staff,

The winter sport season is upon us and brings with it much excitement. It is an opportunity for our parents and students to come together on a Saturday morning to support their children and fellow scholars.

It is wonderful to witness the support and camaraderie that occurs amongst our rugby, hockey and netball players at a Saturday Derby Day. I also value the support afforded us by our Parents' Association. They always add to the vibe and the atmosphere of the day dressed in their splendid supporter's shirts and donning their especially made aprons. I love the early morning smell of bacon and eggs, the brewing coffee, the braaiing of boerewors. What better way to spend a Saturday morning?

Co-curricular activities, nurture in students the qualities of teamwork, reliance on others, commitment to a common goal and leadership. It is this last quality – LEADERSHIP – that provides our students with opportunities to accept and develop leadership which is seen as a major goal of the Co-Curricular Programme at St Peter's College. Whether it is the captaincy of a single group or the leadership of entire sports activities, the duties and responsibilities required of the role, provides students with experience in a major "life skill". The College does not regard the leadership of some activities as being more important than others. The lessons learnt and the experiences gained occur regardless of the specific activity.

Expectations:

The College expects of all our students participating in any form of co-curricular activity the following traits:

- 1. To place the welfare of the "activity" before "self".
- 2. To set a high standard of behaviour and co-operation as an example to members of the activity.
- 3. To uphold and promote the Mission Statement of St Peter's College.
- 4. To support the MIC and Coach, and obey all rules and regulations regardless of personal preferences.
- 5. To exhibit the qualities of integrity and sincerity.
- 6. To inspire a sense of school spirit within the activity.
- 7. To be a loyal supporter of the activity and all involved in it.
- 8. To act with initiative while remaining aware of his/her authority.
- 9. Instil pride in the "College Badge" and all that it represents.
- 10. Play hard and never give up.

Parental Support:

The aim of sport at St Peter's College is to encourage participation and to engender in players the highest standards of sportsmanship, self-discipline and control. Parents and supporters need to support these ideals in the way in which they behave on the sidelines.

Thus, at matches:

- 1. Positive support will be appreciated.
- 2. Parents and supporters are requested to refrain from directing negative comments at Referees, any other officials, players or opposition supporters.
- 3. Parents and supporters are asked to position themselves well clear of the field and refrain from standing or sitting behind the goals.
- 4. Parents are to stay out of the Technical or Substitute area for the duration of the match.
- 5. In the event of an Injury, parents and supporters are not allowed on the field, we employ a highly reputable emergency service provider in Destination Medicine.
- 6. Parents are not to interfere with the Coach's team selection for any game and should refrain from communicating directly with players during a game.
- 7. Support your son or daughter at all times irrespective of what team they play for, especially with encouraging and positive support.
- 8. Remember that there are always valuable life lessons to be learned in winning or losing.

Guidelines for Students:

Below are the expectations of all our pupils at all fixtures. The following are NOT allowed:

- 1. Chewing gum;
- 2. Standing with their hands in their pockets;
- 3. Being rude and/or make rude gestures to the visitors or the opponents before, during or after the game;
- 4. Showing disrespect towards the hosts in any manner;
- 5. Smoking or using alcoholic beverages on the trip or during a fixture;
- 6. Using abusive or crude language before, during or after the fixture.

The following are, however, required of our pupils:

- Appropriate manners at all times;
- 2. Good sportsmanship at all times;
- 3. Informing the coach and/or teacher in charge if you are not going to return with the group on the bus;
- 4. Thanking the teacher and bus driver once the trip is over.

The Queensbury Rules:

In conclusion, it is apt that we take note of the Queensbury Rules which were the first attempt of instilling sportsmanship and fair play in a sporting code.

In 1867, the Duke of Queensbury established a set of rules for professional boxing. A Code of Conduct, if you like, wherein the respectability of boxing as a sport was entrenched. This moral code was accepted internationally. Amongst other things, it required as boxer to wear gloves. Each round would last for only three minutes and punching below the belt was outlawed.

Although boxing was considered violent, the rules attracted gentlemen to the sport. With the passage of time, the rules and the morals have survived. In popular culture the term is used to refer to a sense of <u>sportsmanship and fair play</u>. Let's strive to live by the ideals of the Queensbury Rules.




Tour de Math


