FROM THE RECTOR

When I was at school (the Dead Sea was only critical at that stage), it was customary for teachers to assign an essay entitled "My Holiday" at the start of term. So here is mine.

We spent the first week at a well-known timeshare resort on the North Coast of Kwa-Zulu.

During this time, which we spent with children and grandchildren, the following occurred at home:

- The Great Dane ingested the fibre stuffing from its bed and had to have an emergency bowel operation from which, the Vet warned us, it was unlikely to recover.
- I contracted a severe tummy bug, the anti-biotic for which prevented any exercise.
- Pam was summoned to the CCMA.
- A geyser burst in the house.

We returned to campus for the final 3 weeks. Bliss. The Great Dane recovered. 4 of the school chickens hatched clutches totaling over 30 chicks. Rob Macaulay became a grandpa.

All was heavenly until the last week. The events in the country left us feeling resentful, disheartened, depressed, angry and fearful for our own and our children's futures. There is such an obvious lack of accountability, morality and leadership in so many spaces.

When news is overwhelmingly bad as is this, it's very easy to lose sight of the good. Moreover, when we hear it, we tend to minimise it.

The fact is, that in the "Republic of No Consequences" there has been a great deal of good progress. Those of you who read the address of the State President to the World Economic Forum while the nation listened to his pre-recorded briefing on measures to protect women and children, will have noted his determination to eradicate corruption and to have the perpetrators serve jail time. In ridding our institutions of those whose motives are self-enrichment and indifference to the poor, much good has been quietly achieved at SARS by the dogged Edward Kieswetter, by the Finance Minister, Pravin Gordhan, Shamila Batohi (experience in the International Court) at the National Prosecuting Authority and the highly competent and determined Advocate Andy Mothibi at the Special Investigations Unit (SIU). Those of you who receive newsletters from the Nedbank Private Wealth Investment Research will have read JP Landman's wonderfully comprehensive overview of the many steps that have been taken to clean up government institutions. So, while counting school chickens (after they had hatched), I pondered what lessons the school could learn from the horrific events of the past week.

We need to teach our pupils that we are all God's children, equally precious in his/her eyes; equally valued, regardless of race, ability, origin, gender, age (I put that in for me) or any other defining factor. When we demean (or worse) any other human being, we are demeaning ourselves.

The notion that women should obey their husbands and partners emanates from an era when survival depended on physical strength. We have to disabuse our children of the notion that women are subject to the whims of men. The "Thinking Skills" programme at St Peter's assumes an even more important status when related to last week. South Africa needs decision-makers who think broadly about each problem: the positive, the negative, interesting, the long-term as well as short-term consequences, **all** people affected by the decision, the emotive and objective aspects. Too many decisions are made by people on the basis of what they think they know and not what they actually know. Children need to learn the art of broad, comprehensive and deliberate consideration of problems.

The chasm of inequality has to be addressed deliberately and effectively. As such, St Peter's will make every effort to expand our Teacher Intern Programme. Great teachers are the most effective way to tackle these challenges. We currently host 24 intern teachers and will do everything we can to double this number.

I spent the last weekend of the holiday between Bombela (Nelspruit) and White River. A prominent Lowveld school had asked me to facilitate the Leadership Development Programme which we have developed at St Peter's. The hostelry where I was billeted is frequented by travelling tradesman, professionals and service providers. Each evening, I took the opportunity to speak to Telkom and Transnet employees, former prison warders and waiters.

The experience was a stark reminder of how many decent, intelligent people exist in our country. Nobody had pulled the wool over their eyes. They were scathing about the corruption and horrified at the misguided violence. They reinforced my faith in the country's people.

On Monday, the staff returned to school. We gathered to share a moving Eucharist service.

Thereafter, the entire staff met: teachers, caterers, cleaners and administrators. We committed to continue offering a world-class education to our children.

Catherine Steenhoff told me to get my hair cut. Thankfully, some things don't change.
