CULTURAL

On Monday morning, I had the privilege of having a 'sneak preview' of our Grade 7 play. Very sadly, I'll be away next week at a Girls' Schools Conference. I need to tell you – it's simply amazing! The play is still a week away, ticket sales are now open - I encourage all Senior Prep Girls and their parents to attend.

I'd also like to congratulate our Chapel Choir who performed at the Singing Sista's Choir Festival, last week and our

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Cadet Choir who performed at Summit College the week before. Both performances were phenomenal! Well done, to all the girls and teachers involved. I was one very proud Headmaster!

SPORT

Last Friday we hosted a very well attended Sports Meeting. The objective of the meeting was to share some crucial sporting philosophies as well as a number of processes and procedures recently discussed, and agreed, by our Sports Department. It was also an opportunity for the school to gain a better understanding of parents' current concerns regarding sport in the Girls School. The ultimate mandate is for the school to produce a policy document, which will be a combination of the presentation (available for viewing at <u>Girls School, Physical Education - website page</u> and then open the *Girls School Sports Powerpoint Presentation*) and the suggested solutions to the common issues raised by parents, shared below:

- Is the current St Peter's Sports Philosophy being carried through to new and peripatetic coaches who might be unfamiliar with the school and the girls?
- Are the necessary skills being be taught in Grades 1 and 2, as there seems to be disquiet amongst the Grade 3 girls and parents?
- Are the girls able to rotate positions in netball and hockey?
- Do we spend enough time reaffirming sporting skills in Grade 3, before we choose teams?
- How do we ensure every girl has equal opportunity to be selected?
- Are parents aware of the selection criteria?
- If we want to be competitive should the best coach be coaching the A team?
- Can teams with additional players, or reserves, use these in rotation to provide more playing opportunities for everyone?
- Should our swimming team have at least one team training session before a gala?
- Should we be training more than once a week, bearing in mind that we only have one pool but many swimmers?
- How do we encourage girls who never make it into a team or onto the bus, to continue to love sport, regardless?
- Should the private clubs and clinics held at St Peter's be more widely advertised?
- Could there be more Saturday Sports Festivals?
- Who should parents contact for the different sports?
- Good sportsmanship (do's and don'ts) needs to be instilled. The school needs to be stronger in encouraging parents and children to stay until the end of all the sports matches.

As may be appreciated, this is an ongoing process and a follow up meeting will be crucial. If there any other points/issues that were discussed at the meeting and which have not been documented above, please could I ask you to send them to Chris Tomsek at <u>ctomsek@stpeters.co.za</u>.

I would like to thank all the parents who attended this meeting and for the positive atmosphere in which the discussion took place. There was a clear understanding that both the parents and the school want the same thing: We want our girls to be passionate about playing sport, regardless of the team for which they are playing. We want effective and timely communication regarding fixtures/teams etc. We want open, two-way positive communication between parents and school. We desire a policy, which ensures transparency and consistency at all times. We hope that the first draft of this policy document will be ready before the end of this term.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH AT SEFIKENG

Our Community Outreach at Sefikeng has continued to grow exponentially this term. This has been largly due to the fact that a decision has been taken by the JP Heads and the Foundation, to utilise all interns on Tuesdays at Diepsloot and Wednesdays at Sefikeng. This means a total of 18 interns go on these days. This increase in 'manpower' has created the following impact:

- At Diepsloot, more children can be reached in smaller groups, with the interns being mentored and guided by Jenny Taylor of Phono-Graphix.
- At Sefikeng we are now able to reach three of the grades Grade 0, 1 and 2.

In Grade 0 there is a dedicated team of moms who, along with Charmaine Ndzwane from the Girls JP, do fun, interactive perceptual and gross motor lessons with the children.

In Grade 1, the fact that we have some dedicated volunteer moms and the additional interns, means that the groups are very small. There can be as little as two children per volunteer and they thus benefit from intensive focus on the phonics taught to them. With the assistance of Jenny Taylor we are now implementing her Phono-Graphix programme into Grade 2.

In Grade 2, pupils have been assessed and streamed into three groups. These groups are then run by up to three interns at a time, each group broken up into smaller groups.

On visiting Sefikeng last week and watching all the above in action it was so exciting to see the way the programme has continued to grow and improve. A huge thank you to all the volunteers who give of their time. The invitation is open to everyone to please feel free to come and join us on a Wednesday to be a part of, as Jenny Taylor calls it . . Teaching Africa to read!


DALENE PATON

There is no charge for this presentation and no need to book seats.

Sophisticated anti-theft technology has made it increasingly difficult to steal motor vehicles. As a result we are witnessing a dramatic increase of vehicle hijackings. To the unprepared driver who does not understand the concept of situational awareness the hijacker has the element of surprise and attack. We are dealing with specialised syndicates who run international multimillion Rand operations. They are highly organised and very successful and well trained in the art of hijacking. The sad reality however is that the hijack victim is totally unprepared. Armed attacks of this nature are extremely intimidating and frequently end in tragedy. Understanding this hostile environment and the psychology of the hijacker can only come from proper training, and this presentation will equip you with the knowledge on how to minimize the risk of being hijacked and the modus operandi of hijackers. The presentation (presented by leading Anti-Hijack specialist Francois Marais) covers both *avoidance* and *survival* as follows:
