

ST PETER'S GIRLS PREP SCHOOL

FROM THE HEADMASTER

At the beginning of this year Carmen Whitfield, an Educational Psychologist, was appointed as the Head of our Academic Support Unit (ASU). Carmen has already added tremendous value in terms of providing critical support for our girls and teachers from Grade 0 to Grade 7 in the development of our personalised learning process.

This process should enable each girl to work at their respective level of understanding, regardless of their grade. This philosophy challenges traditional schooling paradigms that suggest, for example, if a girl is in Grade 6, they should only be doing Grade 6 work. Our feeling is that, if they have the ability to read or calculate at a Grade 8 level, they should have the opportunity to do so. Conversely, if they are not ready to cope with Grade 6 work – they should be provided with the relevant support and guidance to bring them 'up to speed'.

This support and guidance is obviously varied depending on the individual needs of the girl.

The support and guidance starts in the classroom where our teachers make every effort to personalise their teaching to accommodate different needs – as mentioned in last week's newsletter. We also have numerous periods every week where an additional teacher joins a class, in Maths and English, to provide better individual support – this is a value-add, which not many schools are able to provide.

There are still times, however, when a teacher may need additional support and guidance to cope with a particular girl's individual needs. This support is provided at weekly class meetings with Carmen, where individual girls are discussed and specific recommendations are made. These recommendations are then put in place, in the classroom, and reviewed on a regular basis. If they are not proving effective, Carmen may then suggest individual therapy or a full Academic Assessment.

As you may be aware, we have a number of phenomenal therapists and support teachers working at our school. Lisa Human is our Speech and Language Therapist. Some of her focus areas include: articulation, auditory processing, language difficulties and fluency disorders. It is important to note that Speech Therapy addresses areas which precede literacy skills. Therefore, a child who struggles with reading or spelling may need to see a Speech and Language Therapist before any other intervention. This forms the foundation of any language development.

Saskia Leenstra, Kathryn Tarlton and Fiona van der Zee are our three Occupational Therapists. Occupational Therapy focuses mainly on sensory modulation and postural control. Together, these areas form the foundation of effective learning within a classroom environment. If these areas are not addressed timeously, this could negatively affect the child's overall development.

Micaela Laios is our remedial therapist in the Junior Prep. Micaela offers girls individualised remedial support focusing on consolidating areas such as: Mathematics, English and organisational skills. Remedial therapy often takes place after foundational therapies (Speech and Language Therapy and Occupational Therapy) have been completed, to ensure that there is transfer into the classroom.

Sue Garner provides girls with Academic Support and individual Mathematics intervention. More recently, she is offering short skill-based workshops. These workshops do not replace any necessary intervention; they rather provide girls with some additional support in specific areas.

Samantha Schulz is a physiotherapist who focuses on developing areas such as core strength, hypermobility and girdle strength. These areas are important to support a child's physical ability to learn optimally in the classroom environment.

(Although we are privileged to work with such an experienced and knowledgeable team of therapists, it needs to be remembered that parents are never compelled to utilise the services of *our* therapists. In fact, we are always able to provide a list of external service providers, should parents request one).

Carmen also monitors the effectiveness and progress of these therapies by meeting with the therapists on a regular basis. In this way, she becomes 'the common thread' that tracks our girls from Grade 0 through to Grade 7 on their academic journey. I'm sure you join me in welcoming Carmen to St Peter's Girls Prep School and thank her, in advance, for the incredible value she will be adding to our school.

LIGHTNING

I can understand that the recent lightning conditions have caused significant frustration for parents not being able to collect their daughters as planned. However, what I cannot understand, is parents who verbally express their frustrations to the teachers - who are merely following school protocol by not releasing the girls under these conditions.

Parents are not permitted to send a sibling to 'fetch' a child. In such instances, the teacher-in-charge will keep both children under shelter for their safety. Please could I ask that all parents demonstrate a little more patience when the school is under lightning conditions – we are doing everything we can to keep your children safe.

A further reminder of our 'lightning conditions' protocol - girls are to move quickly to the nearest indoor venue or stay inside.

- If the lightning siren goes off while a class/grade is participating in an afternoon activity, the teacher-in-charge will direct them to the nearest indoor venue and stay with them until it is safe to move or they are collected by a parent/guardian. The teacher will notify Reception of the girls' whereabouts, so that they can be collected from that venue.
- If the lightning siren goes off or sport is cancelled due to wet weather, girls will be supervised by the Sports Department for the duration of their sports lesson. They will be in the STEM Lab and may be collected from there.
- If the lightning siren goes off while girls are waiting to be collected in the afternoon, they will be required to stay in either the Library or the Grade 4 IdB classroom until collected by a parent/guardian.

Please note that all girls are required to move to the Aftercare Programme facility, after 16:15. If, however, the lightning siren goes off, the teacher on duty will stay with the girls in the Grade 4 IdB classroom until they are collected. It is unsafe to walk across to Aftercare when the school is under lightning conditions.
