### ST PETER'S GIRLS PREP SCHOOL

### FROM THE DEPUTY HEAD OF ACADEMICS

As teachers, we are extremely privileged to be part of your daughter's learning each day and how exciting it is! I would like to share a few experiences of the first six weeks of school. During this time, we feel it is vital to establish an understanding of the values to which we adhere as well as create the St Peter's practice and culture, within the classroom. Independent learning strategies are taking shape and responsibility for one's own learning continues to be encouraged.

### STUDENT-LED CONFERENCES

We welcome all parents to take part in their daughter's Student-Led Conferences for Grade 4-7 and in the Parents Consultations in Grade 3. The girls will complete their own personalised learning report, which includes their achievements and goals. During the interviews, the girls' progress and results will be discussed and there is an open format for communication. These are scheduled to take place in the week of 26 - 28 March, but individual times will be communicated with you, via the Mentors in Grade 6 and 7 and the Grade 3 – 5 class teachers.

Additional feedback is available for parents who require it on Wednesday, 4 April. All specialist teachers will be available, for short consultations, in the hall from 14:00 - 17:00. No bookings are being made for this afternoon, as we hope that the Student–Led Conferences will have provided sufficient feedback in most cases. Formal reports are issued mid-year.

### SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND MATHEMATICS (STEM) LESSONS

In Grade 5 STEM, the girls have been exploring how to look after their new Carnivorous Plants (a Venus Fly Trap and a Pitcher Plant). They have built 'rain catchers', to collect water, which is additive free, to water their plants and keep them healthy. Currently the debate rages as to where the Carnivorous Plants are situated on the Food Web. In Grade 4 STEM lessons, the girls have conducted an experiment using white roses and food colouring to observe how transpiration takes place in plants.





The Grade 6 STEM girls had to design a device that could launch a ball as far as possible, as well as another device to catch it! Some groups managed to launch their balls as far as 4 metres! Their designs were based on the ancient trebuchets, cannons and slingshots. The topics associated with this theme were levers, gravity, trajectories and joints. The girls were constantly using measuring skills while estimating where the launched projectiles would land. This all depended on placing their 'ball catchers' in the correct place.

Grade 7 girls were briefed on the requirements for a particular bridge and were given a short lesson on the forces acting on bridges. They could research various bridge designs and the best way to build a bridge. The girls were then issued with a kit containing glue and lollypop sticks, with which to build their bridge. Finally, we had an engineer test the bridges to see how much weight they could carry.





### **CODING AND ROBOTICS**

Our girls are also privileged to be part of the formal Coding and Robotics programme, which started this year, which runs across all the grades. They have been using a computer programme (Code.org), hands on practical exercises (orienteering) and 'Blue Bots.' This is in preparation for Robotics and an understanding of how robots move, by learning fundamental mechanical skills (wheels, axles, gears and pulleys).

Grade 6 isiZulu girls used Blue Bots in the unit of inquiry on 'Places.' The girls had to programme the Blue Bots to move to places labelled in isiZulu and also provide the directions in isiZulu.





### **MATHEMATICS**

The photos below are of *Creativity Monday* in a Grade 6 Maths lesson. Each girl explains the Mathematics of the recipe or composition, when presenting to the class on a Monday.

The Grade 3 girls integrated the Thinking Maps in Maths, about 'Me'. Here they wrote down numbers, which were related to them e.g. their age, the date of the birth and number of siblings.





. . . And then, we are hard at work improving Maths, English and first Additional Language skills. With these in mind - reading is encouraged at every opportunity!

### ST PETER'S CATERING MANAGER, SHARON RABILAL, ON LISTERIOSIS

In view of the reports on Listeriosis in the press, I would like to reassure you that we don't serve polony or viennas on our menu except on hot dog days. We have removed, however, all ham and salami from the teatime sandwich menu, for the time being.

The use of processed food products is quite limited, as we prefer to provide cooked meals. All sausages/boerewors are purchased from our local butcher, where they are produced on site. The cold meats served are limited to ham and salami, purchased from Bidfood (part of the Bidvest group) and are not of the 'Enterprise' brand. I have contacted Bidfood to provide a clearance/health and safety certificate from their food suppliers.

Our kitchen staff were briefed on Listeriosis at the beginning of the year and we are fully trained on the health and safety procedures to follow in the kitchen, i.e. washing of hands, personal hygiene, the use of sanitisers and making sure that all food is fully cooked.

### PYJAMA DAY

Cancer is an illness that can affect anyone - regardless of age, gender or race. Within our own St Peter's family, we have people who are fighting this disease at present and one of these is a young girl in our Girls School. We, as a school, have therefore chosen CHOC, as our charity, to support this term and for us to remember all children who are fighting cancer.

During the week starting Monday, 12 March 2018, we will therefore, be speaking to the children in our own community, on cancer and how families are affected by this dreadful disease. On Friday, 16 March 2018, we will conclude the week with a 'Pyjama Day.' On this day, we encourage our children and staff to come to school in their Pjs in order to empathise with children who are sick and suffering with cancer.

There is no charge for this day - as this about us, as a community, becoming aware and pulling together to support one another.

### INFORMATION ON THE GRADE 7 FUNDRAISING INITIATIVE

It has been a tradition that the Grade 7s raise funds to give the school a Leavers' Gift. In the past, the funds have purchased or contributed towards various projects. A couple of years ago it was decided to start an Old Girls Bursary Fund, using a portion of these funds. This is different to the Bursary fund offered by the Foundation/School concerning disadvantaged children. The Old Girls Bursary Fund is for any old girl in a difficult financial situation who wishes for their daughter to attend to St Peter's Girls Prep School.

A percentage of the funds raised, therefore, is donated to the Old Girls' Bursary Fund and the rest is donated to a project agreed upon by the girls and School. The girls are asked 'what gift they would like to leave the school?' and are asked to come up with five suggestions. Each suggestion is taken into account and the School then narrows it down to a choice of five, which the Grade 7 girls then vote on. The Grade 7 parents then facilitate the implementation of the project together with the School and the 'gift' is presented to the School towards the end of the year or on completion.
