FROM THE HEADMASTER

A WORD ON INCLUSION . . .

Many parents are aware of the various initiatives and significant effort that has been put into ensuring that every child, parent, member of staff and visitor feels warmly welcome and 'at home' at St Peter's. This is, however, not something that can be achieved by the school alone - every person in the St Peter's community has a part to play.

If a 6-year-old girl, whose judgement and emotional intelligence are in the formative stages of development, makes what we would consider to be a racist comment, we must assume that this is a result of something to which the child has been exposed - whether it be the media, on play dates or overhearing adult conversations.

In the understanding that St Peter's will not tolerate discrimination of any form, the challenge for us is how we police this. Children of this age are only beginning to develop judgment. They do this by emulating adults and peers. The reactions to their behaviour and speech serves to shape their opinions and to demonstrate to them what is, and is not, acceptable. The role of the school AND the family is to provide the requisite guidance. This has to be a shared responsibility!

I believe and I know the Anglican Church would agree, that we have a joint responsibility to be agents of change! We have to be strong enough to challenge racial innuendos, monitor optics and be emotionally mature enough to understand how other people can perceive actions and words. I don't believe there is a finishing line in this process but I do know we have work to do - on ourselves and with our children, every day! In the same way, we need to teach our children the hurt caused by stereotyping people according to their race, their body shape, physical or intellectual ability and all the other differences that make humans such interesting and fascinating beings.

I, therefore, appeal to parents to make a deliberate effort to talk to their daughters, at every opportunity, about diversity and the crucial need for us to celebrate our differences and similarities. This can only be achieved if we, as the adults in their lives, are modelling this behaviour on a daily basis.

From the school's point of view, we need to be better and more deliberate in our efforts to speak to our girls about diversity. To this end, we have engaged with a company called Kopanya Institute to train all our teachers, in this regard, next year.

As Nelson Mandela said: 'We must work for the day when we, as South Africans, see one another and interact with one another as equal human beings and as part of one nation, united, rather than torn asunder, by its diversity.'
